We pray that as our government; our lawmakers, consider the report's recommendations; we ask that you'd work through them; so that we may live quiet and peaceful lives in godliness and holiness. Living for Jesus faithfully; with freedom to serve our neighbours.

Grant Father, that people on all sides of politics; people with differing convictions and different visions of life; would see that religious freedom is good for the flourishing of our community; that it's worth thinking through carefully and talking about respectfully.

Father as the report is released; and as people reckon with its recommendations, we pray that our neighbours, our friends and family who don't know you might be stirred by this matter.

We ask that the conversation wouldn't just end in discussion or debate: about the place of religion in society, or about the right of faith-based organisations to discriminate in some way... Father God our prayer is that you'd be at work in this moment so that people's eyes are opened beyond the freedom of religion issue... to see the great spiritual realities

We pray Father that we'd be having conversations about the reason for the hope we have in Christ Jesus; about why he is Lord; and about how his death and resurrection is of ultimate importance. Help us to show people that we're most free, living under Christ's good and gracious rule.

We pray that people would be coming to a knowledge of the truth; the truth that they need the one mediator, who gave himself as a ransom for all people.

We pray for courage to speak clearly and compellingly about these things when the opportunity arises.
